One last (maybe) reflection from the spiritual renewal weekend that now seems like a year or so ago... On more than one occasion, Bo Prosser said "don't settle for good...aspire to be great."

I did not ask him to explain this challenge, but I believe Bo was encouraging us to give ourselves wholeheartedly to loving our families, neighbors, classmates, coworkers, and everyone else we meet as God has loved us. In this respect, greatness is not measured by the number of people in a worship service or the dollars in an offering plate. Rather, it is measured by such things as visits made to elderly friends, rides offered to neighbors who cannot drive to a doctor's appointment, and moments spent tutoring a child. When Bo encouraged us to aspire to be great he was challenging us to do the things Jesus did and love the people Jesus loves.

Isn't it fair to say that everyone wants to be great? President Trump won the White House by tapping into the nation's desire for greatness, but his idea of greatness appears to be quite different from Jesus' (compare the President's rhetoric to Matthew 20:26-28). Still, if you are trying to be a great nation, a great church or a great person, there is one ingredient that must never be overlooked... sacrifice. Greatness on the athletic field requires the sacrifice of practice. Greatness in the field of academics requires the sacrifice of study. Greatness in business requires the sacrifice of long hours and hard work. Sacrifice is the key ingredient of greatness.

So, if we are to aspire to being great Christians, what must we sacrifice? We need look no further than Jesus. He was the greatest person to ever live, and it is no coincidence that he was also the most sacrificial. Jesus' whole life, not just his death on the cross, was a sacrifice. If we are to follow him we must also seek out ways to sacrifice so that the kingdom of heaven may come and the world may be made whole. Today, tomorrow, and every day of the rest of your life will present you an opportunity to sacrifice and therein, the possibility of becoming great. These opportunities will likely be small gestures of kindness and love but, I hope you will seize them. By doing so, you will become great in the eyes of God, and that is what really matters.
