Hurricane Florence has had a devastating effect on southeastern North Carolina, including Robeson County and the city of Lumberton. This event was particularly devastating to our community, as we are still recovering from Hurricane Matthew which hit us two years ago. The community is still in rescue mode, but as we shift to recovery, we as a congregation hope to work with and support the agencies in our area who will be leading that effort.



For those wishing to help from afar, here are several ways you can help:

Monetary Donations—Donations may be sent to First Baptist Church for hurricane relief. Gifts may be mailed (606 N Walnut St., Lumberton, NC, 28358) or donated online via our secure giving portal (please indicate that gifts are for disaster relief). 100% of funds given will be used in partnership with local agencies providing help to those affected by this storm. We also recommend giving to the CBFNC Diaster Relief fund. 100% of funds given will be used on the ground by trusted partners working in our region.

Physical Donations—Both the city and the county are organizing distribution centers for donated materials. Please take all donated materials to 2300 N Cedar Street; call 910-258-6954 for more information. Please, do not donate any used clothing.

Gift Cards—Gift cards in small amounts (\$10, \$20, \$25) can be used to help a family buy groceries or gas, as well as help provide some stimulation for our local economy. Recommended stores are Walmart, Food Lion, and Lowes Foods. Gift cards may be mailed (606 N Walnut St., Lumberton, NC, 28358). Please indicate the amount on each card.

Prayer—Pray for those displaced and affected by the storm, for those working to serve the community, and for those in leadership making decisions.

A day before the storm hit, a representative from Christian Aid Ministries arrived ready to set up a field kitchen to feed any and everyone who needed assistance. Once the skies opened DSS called and asked if we would be willing to host a site to register people for EBT assistance. As we opened our doors, a small but hard-working army of youth from our church went to work cleaning yards, assisting flood victims and working around the church to welcome our guests from West Lumberton Baptist. As I said, I don't want to ever see another hurricane, but the good that comes afterwards has lifted my spirit and strengthened my faith in God and humanity.

I am thankful that we were more prepared for Florence. Matthew was a harsh teacher, but we learned a few things and I hope we will be able to recover sooner for the preparations we made. One of the lessons I learned from Matthew was that when it comes to a catastrophe like a hurricane the best way to help is to respond to the need that is presented to you. We cannot do everything that needs to be done or be everything our neighbors need us to be. We can simply use the resources we have for God's purposes. A valuable resource we have is our building. I am pleased that with our usual activities, along with hosting CAM and West Lumberton, there are very few corners of our building that are not in use right now. Hosting may cause a few disruptions, but I ask you to remember that there are lot of people who have lost much more than we have. Let's be gracious in our hospitality to our Christian neighbors.

Finally, thank you for being the hands and feet of Christ in these difficult days. Your encouraging words to one another, acts of kindness and generous giving are evidence of the kingdom of God among us.



## Preparing for Sunday . . .

"Keep Still on the Move" Exodus: 14:5-16; 21-29

Moses and the Israelites left the shackles and labor of Egyptian slavery behind and were headed for a promised land. They were barely out of Egypt when Pharaoh changed his mind, gathered his army and took off to re -enslave them. When the Israelites saw the army coming, they panicked, but Moses assured them with the promise, "The Lord will fight for you, and you have only to keep still." (v. 14). In the next verse, the Lord tell Moses to instruct the Israelites to cross the river These instructions seem to contradict one another, but when difficulties arise people of faith Keep Still on the Move by focusing on what God is doing while doing what God has given them to do.
