We are capable of many good works, but it is God who works the miracles of healing and restoration.

So, as some of you go about getting back to normal, and others of you work to rebuild lives devastated by the storm and others grieve the loss of loved ones I simply say "God." Keep minds and hearts focused on the Lord, and you will be empowered to do all that you need to do as you need to do it.
