In his book, Because of this I Rejoice, Vincent sees the disciplines and postures of Lent (prayer, witness, humility, hospitality, asceticism and giving) in the book of Philippians and invites us to practice them joyfully. I will be hosting a study of Because of this I Rejoice on Sundays through Lent this year. Copies of the book will be available first come first serve in the church office for \$12.00. Couples can share a copy of the book. The study will include reading a short chapter in the book, daily bible readings and attendance at a weekly gathering on Sunday afternoons at 4:00. You will need a copy of the book by March 4<sup>th</sup> and we will have our first gathering on March 10<sup>th</sup>.

I hope you will join this study. While I love opportunities such as this to strengthen my walk with the Lord, I also enjoy the privilege of getting to know you and your spiritual life better. Please contact me if you have any questions.


#### Preparing for Sunday . . .

"Finding the Narrow Gate" Matthew 7:1-14, 24-29

We conclude a three week "glance" at the Sermon on the Mount this week with a collection of teachings about judgment, petition, treating others well and wise living. Any one of these lessons would make for a good focus for a sermon, but taken together, they point us to the "narrow gate." Jesus encourages us to enter life through the narrow gate but warns that it is hard to find. Walking the road that leads to life involves honestly handling our own sin, pleading for help and loving others as we wish to be loved. The narrow gate is hard to locate, but once we find our way we live into the authority that astounded the crowds that listened to Jesus.

### **CHILDREN'S CORNER**

Worship together is an important aspect of our life as a family of faith. It's a time to gather with our community, to sing praises to God, to pray and listen to scripture, and to let the Holy Spirit speak to and move us through all the words spoken and sung. As a congregation with two worship services, sometimes it can be difficult to feel connected to each other (or even know those who attend the other service). Some within our congregation have expressed a desire to combine services more often to allow the entire church to worship together and foster our sense of community. Since last year, the Worship Committee has been talking about this desire and discussing how it can happen, noting the difficulty in honoring both styles of worship and the need to have an intentional and meaningful reason to combine. One idea was to combine on the 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays...and as it just so happens, the 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays in 2019 are evenly spaced! So, 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Fellowship was born.

As proposed by the Worship Committee and approved by the Deacons, we will have a combined worship service on each 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in 2019. Each one will have a different specific focus, and we will take turns worshiping in both the Fellowship Hall and the Sanctuary. Our goal for each 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday is to have each one be unique while still incorporating some elements of both services. To add to the fellowship, we will also have a church-wide breakfast in the Fellowship Hall prior to the service (because you know how we Baptists love good food!).

The first 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday will take place on March 31. From 8:45-9:45 am, breakfast (prepared by the Senior Adult Committee) will be served in the Fellowship Hall. (It's okay if you don't get there until 9:00 or 9:15!) At 10:00 am, we will gather in the sanctuary, where the Sanctuary choir will present a Lenten cantata, *The Body of Christ* by Pepper Choplin, and we will take communion together. This will be a wonderful opportunity for us to reflect on the life of Christ in the middle of our Lenten journey. As the time for worship this day is different from our usual schedule, we are asking all Sunday School classes to forego their regular gathering in a spirit of flexibility and fellowship.

The details for the other 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays are still being worked out and will include elements such as sharing faith stories, guest music/preaching, and leadership from our college students. The Worship Committee is excited about what these services may bring and add to our family of faith. As we prepare for this first 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday will you consider doing three things? First, please pray for the choir and other worship leaders as they prepare for this service. Second, consider inviting someone to come that morning for breakfast and worship. And third, plan to come worship that day, even if it is not in your normal worship space or at your preferred time. Our fellowship is stronger when you are there!
