

From the Partor

A friend recently asked me what I love most about ministry. That is one of the easiest questions to answer! I told the story of two year old, Anna

volunteering to say the blessing for a meal at one of our Deacon Care Team gatherings. The twenty or so of us bowed our heads as she thanked God for the good food we were about to enjoy. In telling that story I told my friend that I love helping people respond faithfully to God. I love helping you say "yes!" to the daily invitations God gives us to live the good news. We never outgrow our usefulness to God. No matter how young or old you are, God is inviting you to speak up and to live out your faith. The invitation may be to do something as simple as writing a note to a friend who is grieving the loss of a loved or as challenging as going on a mission trip or teaching a class.

One member of our church family, William Gentry, recently sensed God inviting him to write a book. William recently completed his work and has titled it Let God Transform You. In the book, William challenges us to pay attention to the cultural influences that shape our daily lives. Relationships, entertainment and social media have a profound impact on what we think and feel and thus on how we act. William rightly encourages us to give ourselves fully to God. We "let God transform us" by devoting ourselves to prayer, the reading and study of scripture, being an active part of the body of Christ and service.

It sounds simple and it can be, but we often make Christian transformation difficult. We let life get in the way of the Spirit's work. We care for our families, do our work, keep appointments, fulfil obligations and before we know it, a day is done and we have given little attention to the opportunities God has placed in our hearts to be transformed and to make a difference in the world. Christian transformation begins with being still and knowing that God is God and that God is with us wherever we go. There is not a day that passes that does not have some divine invitation in it to be transformed and to be an agent of transformation in the lives of others.

William and I presented his book at our Family Night at Prayer service this past Wednesday night and several folks purchased copies of the book. If you would like a copy of Let God Transform You please contact William personally. It's a good read that will encourage you to a deeper life in Christ.

## **CHILDREN'S CORNER**

Our 5-week Moms' Study of the five love languages of children has come to a close, and it was a great time together. The desire and commitment of this group to

love their children well is inspiring and something to be celebrated! Naturally, I still have love languages on the brain. As I worked my way through this study, I realized that they aren't limited to parenting or relationships – in fact, we can apply them to our family of faith. When we dedicate children, we promise to support and encourage the whole family and be channels of God's love and grace for them. Here are three love languages that you can use to do just that...

**Words of Affirmation**: Compliment a child after they read/pray/sing. Assure parents that they're doing a good job (because parenting is hard!). Thank them for being present and involved. Let them know that they are a valued part of our family of faith.

**Quality Time**: Sit with a family at Wednesday night dinner and get to know them. Talk to the family sitting close to you in worship. Volunteer in the nursery. Ask a parent how they're doing, and really listen to their response.

**Acts of Service**: Volunteer in the children's ministry! It means a LOT to parents when other adults help with events. Here are some upcoming opportunities where you can do just that:
