My scripture reading for the day was Psalm 30, **Partir** a song of gratitude for deliverance. I was especially drawn to verses 11-12 that say You

(Lord) have turned my mourning into dancing; you have taken off my sackcloth and clothed me with joy, so that my soul may praise you and not be silent. O Lord my God, I will give thanks to you forever. I like the idea of being clothed with joy and I needed to hear it as I had just received word of the deaths of a couple of acquaintances. I have also recently learned of church members who have lost loved ones. These are not personal losses to me, but the deaths have been numerous of late.

I needed to hear that God clothes us with joy. I am grateful for this promise, but I know that joy is not as easy as getting dressed in the morning. The loss of a loved one is difficult to work through and there are times when we wonder if the joy God wants to clothe us in has gotten lost in the laundry! My devotional reading for the day reminded me that even Jesus had days like this. Jesus experienced the depth of life as we do, but he remained faithful through a steadfast prayer life.

The core question of Jesus' prayers (and ours) is one of trust. When we ask God for anything we are putting our trust in the love and power of God to not only cloth us with joy, but to set the world right, to make things better. Richard Rohr writes that the question "is God to be trusted?" is the great question the human race is asking at the most basic level. Rohr goes on to say that "the answer we hear from Jesus' life, death and resurrection is "yes, God is on your side. Yes, God is more for you than you are for yourself."

I hope you believe that God is more for you than you are for yourself. This idea tells me that while God wants to clothe us with joy, God is also working from the inside out. We can thus grieve the death of a loved one honestly and yet be comforted, joyful even, in knowing that death has been swallowed up in victory (I Cor. 15:54). I am sorry for the sting of death that many people carry these days but in the spirit of Psalm 30, I will not be silent in my faith that the joy of God being for us is greater than the pain that is presses against us.


