CHILDREN'S CORNER

There have been a lot of conversations about safety at First Baptist recently. Lighting, emergency plans, locked doors...we've talked about a variety of ways to do our best to keep our congregation physically safe, and I'm thankful for those who have put together plans and preparations for the unthinkable.

There's another side to physical safety, though, that can't really be put into an emergency preparedness binder: physical boundaries with each other. In light of the #MeToo movement, the concepts of consent and boundaries have been an important conversation. Regardless of how you may feel about some of the individual situations that have been highlighted in the media, I hope we can all agree that consent is important and a crucial aspect of how we interact with others.

Conversations about consent shouldn't wait until the teenage years and romantic relationships, though. They have to start with children and bodily autonomy, and they go beyond "private parts" to all aspects of physical touch. Researchers are advocating more and more for teaching children of all ages that they are the boss of their bodies, that they get to decide if/when they want to hug or high five someone, and that the adults in their lives have to listen and respect when they say no. The philosophy is that, by respecting the "no" of children now, they learn that their no matters, and that the no of someone else matters. As they grow older, that understanding translates into healthier and safer physical boundaries in relationships (and interactions with others in general).

We want to raise our children to become adults who are empowered to establish boundaries and also respect the boundaries of others. In addition, we as a congregation have a responsibility to offer a safe space for all, and part of that includes appropriate physical boundaries, especially when it comes to our children. Here are a few tips for how to interact with children at church:

- If you see a child you know and want to offer a hug, ask first. If they say no, offer a high five or fist bump. If they still say no, accept and affirm their no. Even if last time it was a yes, that does not cancel out the current no. Avoid using guilt or bribery.
- If you have a child's permission to hug, and in the middle of it, they pull away with a "stop" or "no," stop immediately. Don't take it as a challenge to continue.
- Read the child's body language. If they child is shrinking away or cowering, that is also a no.
- Before you reach out to interact with a child, compare the situation to how you would act with an adult acquaintance (i.e. not a family member or close friend). Would you reach out and tickle them? Would you play with their hair? Would you start rubbing their back? Would you force them into a hug? I hope your answer to all of those questions is a resounding no! The same rules of bodily autonomy apply to children.

When we dedicate children in our congregation, we promise to help raise and support them. Reinforcing rules of bodily autonomy are another way we can help live into that commitment. Let's continue to strive to make First Baptist a safe and welcoming place for children and their families.
