Preparing for Sunday...

Message Delivered. Message Received? Hebrews 1:1-4

In our day there are several ways to communicate. We can write a letter or send an email. We can text, tweet or use other forms of social media. The importance of the message dictates the medium by which it is sent. The writer of Hebrews tells us that over the course of time, God spoke in many and various ways. Our ancestors heard God speak through the prophets, signs, etc. but when God really wanted to get the point across, God spoke to us by a Son. God spoke through the law, through faithful messengers and through events, but the purest, most exact message to us from God is in the life and teachings of Jesus. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being (v.3). The message has been delivered. Has the message been received?



First, a confession and an apology... I was selfish this past Sunday. I was preaching to myself. I suppose it was kind of me to let you listen in on a sermon that I unintentionally wrote to me, but I do apologize. It was a little amusing though when one of you approached me with a kind word about the sermon and then said "that one was for my friend sitting beside me, wasn't it?" I did have her friend in mind as I wrote the sermon, but was preaching to myself.

A second irony is that I mistitled the sermon. I titled it "A New Song in My Mouth," but it should have stayed with my first idea for a title... "Heard, Lifted, Set and Secured." Those are the four things the Lord does for the writer of Psalm 40. In verses one and two he writes...

I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry. He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire; he set my feet upon a rock, making my steps secure.

That evening, Sandra and I went out to eat. We noticed a friend from out of town was in the restaurant and we wondered why he was eating alone. As we were leaving, we waved and he motioned for us to come over. He asked if I had a couple of minutes. I said "yes," and he started to tell me his story. His wife was in the hospital and he wanted to know if I knew of resources with which to help her. We talked for several minutes and then prayed and assured one another that all would be well. As I walked away I realized my friend was praying Psalm 40... crying out to God in the faith and hope that God would hear, lift, set and secure.

The more I think about it, the more I appreciate the practicality of Psalm 40. We can and must cry out to God in our prayers, but we must also ask one another for help. God can work any way God wants to work, but from what I see, God most often works through people helping one another. We are the body of Christ in the world and we have the opportunity to be the ears and hands of God each day. So, listen to your neighbor in need, offer the help you can and trust that as you quietly go about sharing the love of Jesus that *many will see and fear, and put their trust in the Lord* (Ps. 40:3).
