A Note from the Pastor's Desk

One of my favorite movies is the 2010 film "The Way" starring Martin Sheen. In the movie, Sheen plays a father whose son was killed while completing a pilgrimage along the Santiago de Compostela (The Way of St. James) in Spain. The father travels to Spain and resolves to complete the spiritual journey himself in an effort to better understand both his son and himself. The film tells the story of his travels and the cast of characters that he meets along the way. It is beautiful to watch the change that happens in the father over the course of the film as he gains a new understanding and appreciation for himself, his son, and the world around him.



A pilgrimage is a journey that a person or persons take to a place in order to discover something new about themselves or others. Oftentimes this "place" is a physical location that is somewhere new, unexpected, or unexplored to the traveler. A pilgrim returns from their journey renewed, restored, or transformed into a richer version of themselves. In faith communities, pilgrimages are intentional journeys that are taken by people of faith to locations of significance or unexplored destinations as a way to encounter God in a new way. They enter into this journey with the intention of being changed. They aim to experience God in a new way that leaves their lives altered for good.


Here at First Baptist Lumberton, I believe that God has brought us to such a time of discernment and exploration. Beginning this month, we are beginning a time of intentional introspection on what the mission for FBCL will be in this new season of our ministry. We are calling this process our Mission Discernment Pilgrimage, or MDP. We want to answer the questions of why we exist, what we aim to do in our community, and what motivates us to do so. It will consist of six main sessions between February-May, and this month's sermon series will explore the understanding of mission as scripture and God understands it. At the end of this process, we will create a mission statement that will become adopted by the church, printed on documents, incorporated into our branding and publications, and serve as the lens through which we view our decision-making going forward. Through this pilgrimage, we may even look further down the road and craft a vision statement of what we hope to make a reality through living into our mission or produce a list of values that we hold dear as the people of FBCL. All of this is aimed to clarify who we are, who we want to be, and how we want to go about doing it.

Like many people of faith have done for centuries, we are about to embark on a journey to a new and unexplored reality for our faith family. We enter into it with the intention of encountering God in a new way, desiring to come away from that encounter changed. Through this transformation, we hope to reaffirm who God has called us to be and discover how we can live into that calling in new, intentional ways to continue to connect with our community. Yet to do this, it will take a very important ingredient to make it the best it can be...you. I am inviting all who are a part of our church to be a part of this journey. Young or old. New or veteran. Confident or doubtful. This is our faith family's journey, and we need all of us to be a part of it so we can arrive at the destination together. I do not know where God will take us, but I do know that if we join together, it will be exactly where God needs and wants us to be. Let's take this journey together!
