

A Note from the Pastor's Desk



Maybe it has something to do with short work weeks? Maybe it's the proximity to a holiday? Or maybe it is just wishful thinking that given those two elements, it would be a slow week around the office? Well given the fact that our building experienced a small fire in the parlor the Monday of Thanksgiving week, and then now a large water line bursting in the children's building while the church and ECM were closed for the Christmas holiday, I am starting to wonder what the connection is? As someone asked me last week after acknowledging first the fire,

then the leak, "what comes next?"

It is funny how we often convince ourselves that difficulties or tragedies come in waves. Maybe that is because sometimes they do. Little things hit us at different moments and in different ways. Then there are seasons in our lives where we may feel like we are just treading water in a sea of challenges. But we are the ones who determine how we view these particular instances in our lives. For me, the thing that I have taken to focusing my mind on in the wake of these frustrating snafus is that they provide opportunities. Opportunity to try new things, to experience things that we normally would, yet in different circumstances or venues, forcing us out of the rut of the "same-ol, same-ol." Now this certainly is not my attempt to downplay the displacement, the cost, or the inconvenience that many of these issues have caused in the last several months, but it is all about the perspective we take.

The Bible has much to say about enduring difficulties (<u>Matt. 6:19-34</u>) and the hope we have in God's presence during such times (<u>Isaiah 41:10</u>), but I am particularly fond of the rendering of James 1:2-4 in the Voice translation, "Don't run from tests and hardships, brothers and sisters. As difficult as they are, you will ultimately find joy in them; if you embrace them, your faith will blossom under pressure and teach you true patience as you endure. And true patience brought on by endurance will equip you to complete the long journey and cross the finish line—mature, complete, and wanting nothing." In that I hear that difficult moments have the potential, the opportunity if you will, to grow us as individuals, as a community, and ultimately as followers of Jesus. It is all in how we choose to view the things that happen to us in our lives. So in this new year, whatever may come our way, let's all choose to meet it head on, and with hearts full, knowing that we have the opportunity to experience God in new ways together!

Isn't a new year a wonderful thing? It reminds us of our capacity to start afresh, to try new things, and to push ourselves, with God's guidance, to become better versions of ourselves. Sometimes this means changing our eating habits.

We, as a family, have decided to restrict our intake of red meat to once/week. This will make cooking a challenge, but it will likely mean we will need to get out of our culinary routine. We will need to try to prepare new things from different cultures. Hopefully, this will contribute to healthier lifestyles, less environmental damage, and more creativity.

Some inspiration will no doubt come from our new favorite Netflix series, *Somebody Feed Phil*. If you are unfamiliar with the show, it features Phil Rosenthal, the creator and writer of *Everybody Loves Raymond*, traveling to areas around our country and around the world. He enthusiastically explores new cities, meets new friends, and spends most of his time consuming a wide variety of food.

One thing I've learned from watching, whether he is in New Orleans, London, or Rio, is that the best foods are created when unlikely combinations of cultures interact. For example, in Brazil, the French, Dutch, and African population were clashing with the ruling Portuguese. A side effect of their military collaboration was an amazing culinary collaboration. The result of different cooking styles is often greater than the sum of its parts.

So perhaps we should learn from this as a church. More styles, more ethnic diversity, and more ideas all force us to change our way of doing things. It teaches us to see things through different lens. It leads to more empathy and understanding. Diversity makes sense for a church that was founded to follow a Jewish Messiah that was visited by Zoroastrian priests, briefly lived in Egypt, and grew up surrounded by Romans.
