A Note from the Pastor's Desk November 2023

In a recent sermon, I mentioned a burgeoning theory from the field of adult development called "fallback theory." The idea of fallback theory is that when a person experiences times of unrest, pressure, emotional distress, or some other kind of stress, we may be susceptible to reverting to decision-making practices that were from a previous time in our development. To put this into a real-world example, we may see someone who becomes very angry and starts acting in a way that we deem to be irrational, so we may say something like, "They are acting like a child." This is sort of what fallback theory is trying to get at.



This article is not meant to be critical of our times of fallback, but if we were honest with ourselves, we have all experienced times where we probably were not proud of the way we handled certain situations. In a non-heightened emotional state, we see with clear eyes where we could have responded differently, more thoughtfully, or more reasoned when facing a particular situation. While we may experience fallback on account of moments with friends, family, work, or community stressors, might I suggest that we are also susceptible to experiencing fallback when it comes to our spiritual lives as well?


There are absolutely times when the stresses of this life impact our spiritual walks as well. Maybe we see some of the events of the world and ask a question that many children will ask, "Where is God?" Maybe we experience a tragic loss in our lives of some kind, and we look in the mirror and ask, "Why me God?" Fallback might creep in when we think about the possibilities of what could lie ahead for us individually or collectively as a Church, and so we may only think of options in terms of what we have already encountered, cutting ourselves off from new opportunities or different ways of imagining God working in and through us.

Despite these less-than-optimum aspects of fallback, one thing that fallback theory suggests is that though fallback is not always unavoidable, it can however teach us something. We can grow from the experience of fallback. So for our faith, it is not wrong to ask "Where is God?" or "Why me God?", but where we error is when we stop searching for the answers or fail to embrace the ambiguity of God as a natural part of growing in our faith. Maybe growth is accepting that there are just some things we cannot know about God, and rather than that being a hindrance to us, it is in fact a deeper realization of just who God is. So while we may fallback to the old ways of doing things at times, the less mature versions of ourselves, that doesn't always have to be who we are going forward. So as we experience challenge, or as we look toward what the future might bring for us as a community of faith, let us instead seek to fall forward into the arms of our loving, embracing God, so that we may discern all of who God is leading us to become!



BBQ for Community Café—Nov. 18



The Christ Candle is lit at the beginning of Worship and stays burning through the service as a visual reminder of God's presence and light in our lives.
