

Palm Sunday — March 24, 2024





A Note from the Pastor's Desk April 2024

While all four gospels have an account of the Easter morning at the tomb, this year we focus on the version Mark tells in Mark 16. And to state what is obvious when you lay each of the four gospels beside each other, Mark is certainly the shortest of the four. Still, in this perspective, we hear the familiar details of the story; a group of women coming to the tomb, encountering a person (or persons depending on the gospel), finding an empty tomb, and leaving to tell others as the first proclaimers of the gospel.

Let me draw your attention to some of the words Mark uses to describe their emotions throughout the experience. The writer of



For each of us today, I would like to think that a sign of growth in our spiritual journeys is becoming comfortable with not being able to explain God's grand, divine acts. Often, we go into life's situations with predetermined measures of how we will know whether God is intervening or not. Is our loved one healed or not? Will we get the result at work we expect? Will our friends forgive us for when we wronged them? Will we pass this test or not? We are very much conditioned to think of things with clear marks of fulfillment. But then I am still reminded of this matter involving resurrection. Just as those ladies struggled to verbalize what had happened, for us today, while we may be able to recount the details of the event, we really may not be able to adequately convey the fullness of what transpired that morning. But we are no less deterred in our hope and faith that God is at work in this supreme moment.

While Easter can teach us many things, maybe it would behoove us to remember that one of those things is learning to become comfortable with the unexplainable. To follow in the example of those faithful women on Easter morning, and share the story of God's resurrecting interventions in our lives excitedly. Jesus did not tell us to go only when we had full understanding, unwavering confidence in the details, or verifiable facts, he told us simply to believe and to go. This is the truth of resurrection, to simply believe, and to go, trusting that wherever we are sent, Christ will meet us there. Happy Easter to all of our First Baptist community!




