

A Note from the Pastor's Desk March 2024

In my almost 18 years of ministry work, it is a common occurrence that I am asked to share my "faith journey." With much practice, I've got my go-to lines down pretty well. For example, in describing my home church, Mill Creek Baptist (just outside of Roseboro headed towards the Beaver Dam community of Cumberland County), I often describe it as a "small, family church. The kind of place where my mom was the youth director and my aunt was my Sunday School teacher." And all of that is absolutely true. In fact, as I have shared a few times in the last week, I never had a male Sunday School teacher. I recall briefly male leaders with our short-lived Royal Ambassadors program, but all-in-all, in my small country church of 50-75 folks, it was women who did the bulk of the educational, missional, and service formation. But there were two distinct ways in which they didn't, and



that was in the role of deacon and pastor. We had our annual women's day and other specific celebrations (often led by my Mom, I don't mind bragging about her here), but again, as I reflect on my spiritual upbringing, and the people who predominately were my role models of embodying the faith, it was primarily women.

I think that is why when I got to college and seminary and was formally presented with the idea that there were many in Baptist circles who were opposed to women in leadership, it just did not compute with and for me. Not just in my mind, but in my understanding of how I had seen the faith embodied. It was women who had taught me the books of the Bible, shared wisdom in the epic stories of scripture, and conveyed the simple truth in the lyrics, "Jesus loves me. Yes, Jesus loves me." It was women who initially planned the opportunity for our church's teenagers to attend summer camp for the first time. It was women who planned missional activities for us like visiting older shut-ins at their homes. It was women who were the foremost lived examples that taught me what it is to be loved by Jesus and to love like Jesus.

I am grateful that here at First Baptist Lumberton, we have embraced the God-honoring truth that women can, and are called to serve in all ways of God's church. There are biblical accounts, historical practices, and our own life experiences that prove that the Spirit of God moves in such a way to affirm the call of women. But still, there is much that can and should be done to recognize the equal calling of our sisters in the faith. That is why this month we are engaging in Baptist Women in Ministry's Month of Advocacy which also happens to coincide with Women's History Month. BWIM is an organization that brings together women and men to lift up and support the voice and role of women in Baptist churches in a variety of ways. Our participation includes our adult and teenagers' engagement with the "Equally Called" curriculum co-produced by BWIM and CBF, which looks at the biblical case for supporting women in ministry. We also will be holding a celebratory worship service on March 17th, where women clergy and leaders alike will be facilitating our service, with one of the up -and-coming voices of one of our young leaders, Sandra Cox, bringing the message that day. I hope that you see this month both as a celebration and also a call to action. A call not to be silent about supporting all of God's children in our midst. A call to see the value and worth in others, especially our women and young girls. A call to make space for all those whom God has called, to the glory of God's Kingdom!



Mental Health First Aid teaches you how to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illnesses and substance use disorders. This training gives you the skills you need to reach out and provide initial support to someone who may be developing a mental health or substance use problem and help connect them to appropriate care. "Like CPR, one person in every family should be trained in Mental Health First Aid. This is Overflow Foundation's goal." - Terry Lee, Founder and Executive Director

WHAT IT COVERS: Common signs and symptoms of mental illness. Common signs and symptoms of substance use disorder. How to interact with a person in crisis. How to connect the person with help.

WHO SHOULD TAKE IT: Employers, Police officers, Hospital staff, First responders, Faith leaders, Community members, Caring individuals, Educators, General Public.

From our Associate Pastor

As our church, especially our youth group, has become more and more diverse (racially, socioeconomically, etc.), our needs have changed. Our language and activities have become more inclusive. We have grown stronger as have begun to learn from each other and more empathetic as we realize we have much more in common than we once believed.

The majority of our youth come from families who do not suffer greatly from writing checks for trips and activities but an increasing number of our youth simply cannot afford some of the big trips. Sales of barbeque plates are how a sizeable number of our youth afford the ski trip. Donations to our Youth Missions Memorial funds are crucial for many of our single parent families to send their teenagers on our annual mission trip.

As a church, we do a wonderful job with helping the poorest of the poor through generous giving. Sometimes though, we aren't able to do know how to positively impact paycheck to paycheck working class families that never ask for help. Whenever I have made the needs of certain families known, you have never let me down as a congregation. Several of you have asked over the years if you could be of financial help to any of our youth.

I never ask for you to help pay for ski trips (outside of buying and sometimes selling BBQ tickets). We usually rely heavily on the aforementioned memorial funds to make the mission trip doable for some of our youth and more affordable for all. What falls between the cracks sometimes are the little things that I hate to see some of our youth excluded from such as lock-ins, youth week shirts, CBFNC weekend trips, and other events that don't cost a lot as we see it, but require real sacrifice or even a hard "no" from some parents who simply don't have the disposable resources available for any non-necessities.

Please don't see this as us asking for money as much as we are just answering a question. For those of you who may not have much to give beyond your tithes and offerings, concentrate on those. For others who may be looking for a place to positively impact youth of hardworking parents that are doing their best, you may want to consider paying for their youth week t-shirt, helping them pay for the music trip they have earned by faithfully ringing bells, or perhaps this Fall pay for someone's weekend retreat at Ft. Caswell. You can contact Kandace or me if you wish to. If not, we will find other creative ways to help keep all of the students God has sent our way included, but this seemed a good place to start.


