A Note from the Pastor's Desk October 2024

The first Sunday in October is celebrated as World Communion Sunday. Observance of the day is barely a century old. Many denominations or congregations recognize the day, while still many others do not. Of course, it is not a biblical holiday in the sense that it commemorates a specific event like Christmas or Easter, but it does focus on a specific instruction of Christ and is surrounded by the theme of unity. In particular unity of the Christian church. The day reminds Christians of all creeds, colors, languages, and cultures that we are part of a global community of faith. It is ecumenical, meaning that it represents Christians from various expressions or denominations coming together to foster relationships and connectivity.



It is appropriate then that those themes of a global church, connection, and support are also tied to something else we will be conducting throughout the month of October. That is our participation in the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship's Offering for Global Missions (OGM). Our church's support of Global Missions is vital in sharing the Good News around the world. CBF field personnel (CBF's term for missionaries) working in the contexts of the Global Church and Global Migration are committed to the ministry of transformation as they cultivate beloved community, bear witness to Jesus Christ and seek transformational development among people and places otherwise forgotten and forsaken. The theme of this year's offering is "Behold...a New Thing" which is based on Isaiah 43:19 which reads, "For I am about to do something new. See, I have already begun! Do you not see it? I will make a pathway through the wilderness. I will create rivers in the dry wasteland."

The goal for the offering this year across the Fellowship is \$4,000,000. This is the

minimum needed to sustain the presence of current CBF field personnel in 17 different countries. CBF's global missions motto is "Because Presence Matters". This embodies the value of being physically present with those who are hurting or need to hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Just as Jesus came to be physically present with humanity, so too are we called to be physically present with those to whom God calls us to minister and serve.



We will introduce and kick off the offering on World Communion Sunday (Oct. 6) and have a special time of giving to this offering the following Sunday in worship (Oct. 13). During the week of Oct. 6-13, we will invite you to participate in a week of prayer for global missions with guides on how to pray on social media and email. If you would like to continue your prayers for missions intentionally throughout the year, we also have the "Prayers for the People" resource published by CBF which provides daily ways to pray for individuals across CBF missions including a weekly emphasis on different field

personnel. On Wednesdays in October our adult bible study will focus on mission work across the Fellowship, starting on Wednesday Oct. 2, with a showing of the short documentary for the 2024-2025 OGM and continuing the subsequent three weeks with informative Bible studies.

I am looking forward to our month-long emphasis on missional work across the Fellowship with whom we partner. My hope is that we will all be invigorated by this great work, challenged to support it, and encouraged to assume a missional example in our lives right here in Robeson County!

From Our Associate Pastor

This past weekend was my third weekend in a row of officiating a wedding of one of my former youth. The first wedding was in Holly Springs, followed by one in downtown Wilmington, followed by a Morganton wedding. It has been a challenging but emotionally rewarding few weeks.

Wedding venues, much like churches, vary in beauty and in operation. My personal preference is for outdoor weddings as nothing to me is more beautiful than "God's Cathedral." The downside of outdoor weddings is you can't plan weather a year in advance.

Regardless, as I approach my 20th time officiating, it occurs to me that I've done very few weddings in a sanctuary, including just one here in ours. That isn't just my experience. Every other minister I've discussed it with have done an even lower percentage of church weddings.

Why is that? Some of it is cultural. It is true that right now using venues for weddings is more popular. Often the rehearsal, the ceremony, the "cocktail" hour, and the diner/reception can be done on the same grounds. It's practical.

There are other considerations as well that we need to look at. As I understand it, Josh is leading the adults through a study on deconstruction and doubt. Christians can be notoriously defensive of its institutions. Our natural reaction is to want to argue when someone points out a defect in our faith as we are practicing it. My advice for Christians, especially ones my age, is to simply listen.

Before discounting religious trauma, remember the massive sexual abuse scandals in the Roman Catholic and Southern Baptist denominations. Before minimizing the spiritual abuse a young person claims, remember there are pastors and churches who use fear of eternal punishment or excommunication to control and manipulate others. Besides, Jesus commands us to refrain from judging others. Your experience of church may be one of loving memories but others may have endured completely different circumstances.

Another huge issue among the young adults I'm in contact with is the politicization of the church. The idea that you must have pure allegiance to one party or worse yet one human being is of course a form of idolatry. Neither party can claim Christianity. In fact, if you look hard enough you will find folks in both parties who put their faith in God first and those who don't. We need Christian influence in both.

People who leave church do so for many reasons. Ours is not to judge them or their experiences. Our job is to prepare for their return, then run to meet them with arms wide open upon their return.
