

The class will meet for Sunday School at 10:30 am on that date as well. This is a change from their usual meeting time.






A Note from the Pastor's Desk February 2025

Over the weekend I heard a <u>podcast interview</u> with a journalist for The Atlantic named Derek Thompson. He was promoting his newest essay in this month's publication entitled "<u>The Anti-Social Century</u>." The topic and the ensuing conversation were both fascinating and devastating to me. The premise is that over the last century, we have become significantly less social as human beings. No surprise, the smartphone has been a major factor, but as Thompson's research points out, this decline in sociality began long ago with two technological predecessors that initiated it; the automobile and the television.

The summations of the article are more than I can capture here, but essentially, we are spending more time on screens, more time at home, and less time with other actual human beings in all their complexity. Thompson



This discussion hit me profoundly this weekend because I was already planning to use this article this month to highlight one of the most active ministries in our church... our small groups. The various groups in our church take on many forms. We have Sunday School classes comprised of all ages that meet, when else, but on Sunday mornings before worship. Our youth gather on Sunday evenings. There is a Tuesday morning men's group that meets weekly online via Zoom. There is our Women's Missionary Union (WMU) group, a Baptist women's monthly Bible study group, and the Fun & Fellowship monthly gathering on Thursdays. There is a vast array of when, how, and what affinity brings these different groups together.

What remains constant across them all, is the value of connection that is fostered amongst their participants. I happen to find myself in a text-messaging thread for at least two of our church's groups. Sometimes, the frequent dinging of my phone may be a mild irritant at first, but when I open the notification, I am reminded of how valuable these groups are to those who are a part of them. I read messages of people conveying prayer requests, celebrations, concerns they are having for the day, or clarifications on church or community activities. There is a shared connection that is developed between those who are a part of these bodies within the larger community of our church. These are places where you take a deeper step into intimacy and connection with your sisters and brothers in the faith. Connections that are vital to helping you navigate the struggles of life, and to sense the presence of God in both the good and the bad.

So my hope for all of you is that if you are not involved in some way with any of our groups, you would take the first bold step and visit one. Choosing to isolate yourself from others is not how God created us to be. Remember God saw fit to leave the heavenly confines to walk the dusty roads of where we are because the Lord knows the value of real, authentic relationship and connection with others. From Our Associate Pastor

Jesus, in John 14:6, tells us he is "the Way, the Truth, and the Life." In John 1, Jesus is referred to as the Word of God. These are bold claims.

Often in today's world, these claims are ignored or used against others. We I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me.

have a lot of folks who claim to be Christians but do so in order to achieve power and influence. They have no interest in following the teachings of Jesus, but want the benefits of the label.

This is not a new thing. When the early Roman emperors persecuted followers of the Way, those who claimed Christ where relatively small in number. However, when Constantine made Christianity not only safe but also the preferred religion of the Empire, suddenly Rome was brimming with new "converts."

Later on, when a backlash against our faith from a new emperor set in, many of those same converts left (only to return once the balance of power was back with the Church). This pattern repeated itself often through history in different parts of the world. In fairness, at times there where the "Christians" forced false conversions on the masses.

Matthew 7:21 reminds us "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven."

Our world is sadly in a dark place right now. We all would do well to look not only at our hearts but also at our actions and compare them to the teachings of Christ Jesus found in the gospels. As Josh recently pointed out, almost everyone has a Bible, but few people actually read it.

So, with Lent approaching, now is the time to make some decisions. My challenge to everyone is to pick a gospel and read it. I know some of you read scripture daily, but many do not. God seems to be leading me toward Matthew. Please pray that God reveal to you what gospel to study. You don't have to wait until Ash Wednesday to start, but if Lent proves to be the catalyst you need, use it.


